University College Dublin Ireland's Global University

University College Dublin (UCD) is the largest University in Ireland, with over 38000 students drawn from across 152 countries, set on a parkland estate of 133 hectares, and is one of Europe's leading research-intensive Universities, ranked within the top 1% worldwide of higher education institutions.

A true symbol of resilience and determination, Colin Judge has become one of Ireland's most inspiring sporting figures. Born without legs and one arm, Colin discovered table tennis as a young boy — and what began as a pastime quickly turned into a lifelong passion and pursuit of excellence.

Representing Ireland on the international stage, Colin has competed at multiple European and World Championships, and proudly represented his country at the Tokyo 20 and Paris 24 Paralympic Games. His journey has not been without setbacks, including injuries and the challenges of competing at the highest level, but Colin's unwavering focus and belief have continually driven him forward.

Beyond medals and rankings, Colin's greatest impact lies in his example. He represents what's possible when courage meets opportunity — showing young players, with or without disabilities, that barriers can be overcome through hard work, self-belief, and love for the game.

Today, Colin continues to inspire the next generation, both on and off the table, embodying the spirit of inclusion, representation, and perseverance that defines himself and Table Tennis Ireland.

MONASTEREVIN PING PONG CLUB: STORY OF PASSIO PERSEVERANCE, AND COMMUNITY

What began as one person's simple love for table tennis has grown into a vibrant, welcoming community hub in Monasterevin — thanks to the quiet determination and open-hearted spirit of Pauline Marterer.

Originally from France, Pauline's earliest memories of table tennis are filled with laughter and sunshine — games played with friends during summer camps and family holidays. After settling in Ireland, she rediscovered her passion for the sport at Newbridge Table Tennis Club. When the club closed for the summer, Pauline found herself missing the rhythm of play and the sense of connection it brought. Instead of waiting for the next season to begin, she decided to create something new.

When a local community hall became available, Pauline and a friend saw an opportunity to bring table tennis to Monasterevin. With a few donated tables, some second-hand finds, and plenty of enthusiasm, Monasterevin Ping Pong Club was born.

A single phone call to Leinster CCDO Ivanna Yates marked a turning point. Pauline had noticed growing interest from local teenagers and wanted to create a space for them to play and connect. With support from Table Tennis Ireland (TTI), she completed the steps to affiliate the club — including Garda vetting and safeguarding training — and launched a youth club that quickly became a popular fixture in the community.







But Pauline's vision didn't stop there.

After a conversation with Ivanna, the idea of a summer camp emerged. Pauline embraced it wholeheartedly, reaching out to families and organising what became a hugely successful event. The enthusiasm and smiles of the young participants led naturally to the creation of a kids' club, expanding the club's reach to even more age groups and families.

At Table Tennis Ireland, we are proud to stand alongside Pauline and the Monasterevin Ping Pong Club on this journey. From practical support and guidance to the encouragement provided by our CCDO network, this story reflects the power of collaboration — and how sport can bring people together in lasting and meaningful ways.

Looking ahead, Pauline's energy and commitment continue to inspire. With support from Kildare Sports Partnership, she and Ivanna will soon be introducing table tennis to local schools through taster sessions — helping more children discover the joy of the game and the sense of belonging that comes with it. Over the summer, friendly challenge matches with nearby social clubs added another layer of fun and connection, reinforcing the club's growing community spirit.

Today, Monasterevin Ping Pong Club stands as much more than a place to play — it's a reflection of what happens when passion meets purpose, and when people come together around a shared dream. "No dream is too big, and nothing is out of reach. Reading about my achievements made me realise how far I've come — step by step, things just fell into place. I followed my instincts, welcomed ideas from others, and never hesitated to ask for help. Some plans took time to grow, others, like Ivanna's summer camp idea, came to life overnight! I'm deeply grateful to Table Tennis Ireland for helping me move forward so smoothly and efficiently."











IT STARTED WITH A SLIDE:

How Table Tennis for MS Found Its Home in Wexford

When asked to deliver a presentation on how you would set up a Multiple Sclerosis Table Tennis in the community group, I didn't expect it to bounce beyond the interview room. But sometimes, the best ideas start with a slide and end with a serve.

With a background in sports development and a passion for inclusive activity, this was a vision close to my heart. As the new Leinster CCDO, I saw the potential immediately, and, with a few well-placed conversations at a conference, the idea began to rally support.

Thanks to the wonderful collaboration with Ben Hunt from Sports Active Wexford, and the warm welcome from Newbawn Community Centre and

Newbawn-Raheen Table Tennis Club, a weekly Bat & Chat session was born — tailored for individuals with MS and Parkinson's.

Over five weeks, we served up the basics of table tennis in a relaxed, laughter-filled environment. Rain or shine, the group showed up, paddles in hand and smiles on faces. The 11am tea break became a highlight — not just for the biscuits, but for the banter.

The final session was emotional, but not the end. The club has lovingly taken the group under its wing, ensuring the rallies continue. And yes, there was talk of a foreign trip to take on the world of table tennis... so watch this space!







